Melanie Archer

Based in Trinidad and Tobago, Melanie Archer is a freelance graphic designer who has worked in the fields of illustrated book publishing and editorial design for more than 15 years. Melanie is partner/editor at Robert & Christopher Publishers, and a part-time lecturer at The University of the West Indies, St Augustine. She also writes on art, design, and culture.

Andre Bagoo

Andre Bagoo is an award-winning poet and writer from Trinidad and Tobago and the author of several books of poetry including Burn (Shearsman, 2015) and Pitch Lake (Peepal Tree Press, 2017). He is a former newspaper journalist and his essay collection on art and literature, The **Undiscovered Country** (Peepal Tree Press, 2020) won the 2021 OCM Bocas Prize for nonfiction.

Bridget Brereton

Bridget Brereton is Professor Emerita of History, at The University of the West Indies, St. Augustine. Her publications include Race Relations in Colonial Trinidad and A History of Modern *Trinidad*. She was chair of the non-fiction judging panel for the inaugural OCM Bocas Prize in 2010, and again in 2020.

Tobias Buckell

Born in the Caribbean, Tobias S. Buckell is a New York Times bestselling and World Fantasy Award winning author. His novels and almost one hundred stories have been translated into nineteen different languages. He has been nominated for the Hugo Award, Nebula Award, World Fantasy Award, and Astounding Award for Best New Science Fiction Author. He currently lives in Ohio but has been an NGC Bocas Lit Fest regular.

David Edgecombe

David Edgecombe teaches Theatre, Playwriting and Directing at the University of the Virgin Islands. His productions are numerous and include Heaven, which enjoyed a 25th Anniversary revival at UVI in 2016, having premiered in 1991 and toured St. Maarten, St. Kitts, Antigua and Montserrat. He is former Director of the Reichhold Center for the Arts.

Joanne Hillhouse

Antiguan and Barbudan Joanne Hillhouse is a cross genre writer, writing coach and book blogger. Her children's stories include Lost! A Caribbean Sea Adventure and With Grace. Her YA novel Musical Youth won a CODE Burt Award and is on the Caribbean Schools reading list. She is the force behind the Wadadli Pen project, which nurtures and showcases the literary arts in her country through a writing challenge and the Wadadli Youth Pen Prize. http://wadadlipen.wordpress.com

Barbara Lalla

Novelist Barbara Lalla is Professor Emerita, Language and Literature, at The University of the West Indies, St Augustine. She is the author of five novels; her latest, One Thousand Eyes, was published in April 2021. Her numerous scholarly works include Postcolonialisms: Caribbean Rereading of Medieval English Discourse, Defining Jamaican Fiction: Marronage and the Discourse of Survival and the co-authored Language in Exile: Three Hundred Years of Jamaican Creole, Voices in Exile: Jamaican Texts of the Eighteenth and Nineteenth Centuries and Caribbean Literary Discourse: Voice and Cultural Identity in the Anglophone Caribbean.

Karen Lord

Karen Lord is a prize-winning Barbadian author, editor and research consultant. Her debut novel Redemption in Indigo was nominated for the 2011 World Fantasy Award for Best Novel. She is the author of science fiction novels The Best of All Possible Worlds and The Galaxy Game, and the crime-fantasy novel Unraveling. She edited the Peekash Press anthology New Worlds, Old Ways: Speculative Tales from the Caribbean and judged the Commonwealth Short Story Prize and the 2018 CODE Burt Award for Caribbean YA Literature, She has taught several international creative writing workshops.

Sharma Taylor

The debut novel of Barbados-based, Jamaican lawyer Sharma Taylor, What a Mother's Love Don't Teach You, was bought at auction by Virago and will appear in 2022. She won the 2020 Wasafiri Queen Mary New Writing Prize, the 2020 Frank Collymore Literary Endowment Award and the 2019 Bocas Lit Fest's Johnson and Amoy Achona Caribbean Writers Prize. Twice shortlisted for the Commonwealth Short Story Prize, she was also a finalist for the 2020. Elizabeth Nunez Award for Writers in the Caribbean in the Brooklyn Caribbean Literary Festival's Caribbean Fiction Writers Competition.
